The Indigenous peoples of Russia also face many threats to their traditional cultures. For example, today only 10% of Siberia's tribal people live a nomadic or semi-nomadic lifestyle, compared to 70% about 30 years ago. Since 2002, the population of 24 of the Russian Indigenous groups has declined, with only 10 increasing in membership.

The nomadic tribes survived on hunting all types of game, such as elk and antelope, but, the buffalo was their main source of food. Every part of the buffalo was used. In addition to providing food, the Indians used the skins for tipis and clothing, hides for robes, shields, and ropes; they used dried buffalo dung for fuel, made tools, such as horn spoons, scrapers from bone; sinew or muscle ...
